Our History



Our Guiding Principles

Trauma-Informed Care (TIC) is an approach in healthcare, education, social services, and other support systems that recognizes and responds to the impact of trauma on individuals. It emphasizes creating environments of **safety, trust, empowerment, and healing** for people who have experienced trauma.

Harm Reduction is a public health strategy aimed at minimizing the negative consequences associated with certain behaviors—especially those that involve risk, like substance use—without necessarily requiring the behavior to stop.

Housing First is an approach to ending homelessness that prioritizes **providing people with permanent housing right away**, without requiring things like sobriety, employment, or participation in treatment programs as a precondition.

Housing

- ONE TIME ASSISTANCE
 - Participants are served with assistance for the initial costs requested by prospective landlords.
- PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING
 - Assists individuals with a disability and are experiencing homelessness.
- RAPID RE-HOUSING
 - Aims to bring an individual or family into stable housing as quickly as possible
- INNOVATIVE HOUSING
 - Aimed to assist individuals with special circumstances who are unstably housed.



Residential

• Community Bridge

A facility-based residential program serving up to 52 individuals at a time with assistance and supportive services in transitioning from shelter to independent housing.

Currently serving Downtown, Mckeesport, Oakland & Beltzhoover

- Single Shelter Beds = 100
- Permanent Supportive Housing = 24
- Family Units = 8 units/48 beds



Community Programs

- CHS Food Pantry

 - Serving 6,000+ individuals annually and 2,000+ households
- CHS Community & Social Center
 - Located at Wood Street Commons
 - Serving 30 residents/day



City Controller 101

Strip District Neighbors – April Meeting

Wednesday, April 30, 2025

Who We Are:

The City Controller is the fiscal watchdog for the citizens of Pittsburgh and is responsible for protecting tax dollars from waste, fraud, and abuse.

As one of only two elected citywide offices, the Controller provides independent and objective oversight of all city government related finances.

We work to ensure the City's financial integrity and accountability, making Pittsburgh a better place to live and work.



What We Do:

We are responsible for governance and conduct of key aspects of the City's financial operations, including:

- Tracking all revenues and expenditures made by the City
- Overseeing and auditing all payments made by the City
- Ensuring all funds are being appropriately tracked and spent across City government
- Reviewing City departments for inefficiencies and making recommendations to save money or improve delivery of services
- Inspecting and auditing all engineering, architectural, construction, and demolition contracts

We conduct audits and produce regular reports on the City's financial and economic condition and the operations and performance of City government.

Fiscal Health of the City:

- Debt Payments
 - 2025 and 2026 have ballooning debt payments due to loans deferred during the pandemic.
 - This year's debt payment is lower than previously anticipated.
- Challenging years ahead 2025, 2026
 - Recovering from pandemic; American Rescue Plan funds ending
 - Shifts away from in-office work; reduced value of biggest downtown properties; major reduction in tax value
 - Historically high interest rates, fewer home sales, less tax revenue
 - Need for spending decisions to reflect uncertainty
- Fiscal Milestones
 - The City's Interest earnings have grown significantly. While some of this is attributable to American Rescue Plan funds, savvy investing and high-interest rates have provided the City with more long-term security.
 - Licenses and permits have become more profitable as we see development across the City
 - Parking revenues have rebounded to pre-pandemic levels



2025 Preliminary Budget:

Total budget: Spends just under \$657 million – \$29 million less (4.2%) than projected spending in 2024, first cut since 2021

Fund balance: Spends more than half of the current fund balance over the next five years (projected to be \$174 million at the end of 2024, down to \$70 million in 2029).

Revenue:

- 2024 revenues are expected to be around \$699 million (down from \$710 in 2023).
- 2025 budget projects revenue to drop further to around \$660 million (5.5% decrease).
 - Property tax revenue expected to decreases from expected \$152 million to \$144 million next year
 - Budget projects roughly \$6 million from the facility usage fee, which is currently under a legal challenge



2025 Preliminary Budget:

Spending cuts include:


- Cuts the Pittsburgh Bureau of Police from 850 budgeted officers in 2024 to 800 in 2025. 900 officers were budgeted in 2019; 1,091 in 2015. The city expects to spend \$120 million on the Pittsburgh Bureau of Police in 2025. (There are currently 750 police officers in the PBP.)
- Cuts capital spending from \$159 million this year to \$117 million
- The Department of Law budget will drop by about half, after ballooning this year due to nearly \$7 million in legal judgment payouts.
- The Department of City Planning budget will decrease 46%
- The Department of Parks and Recreation budget would decrease 25%
- The Department of Public Works' Bureau of Facilities budget would decrease 21%.

Spending increases include:

- \$3.3 million increase in paving budget
- \$1.8 million increase in demolition budget


